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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sanatan Dharm College, was founded in 1949 by the Sanatan Dharm College Association. Initially affiliated to Agra University, then to C.C.S. University Meerut, is now recognized as a prominent institution of Maa Shakumbhari University, Saharanpur. It is situated in Muzaffarnagar (U.P.) and has a history of being one of the foremost colleges of western U.P. since the time it was affiliated to Agra University. At present 5566 students are enrolled in the college and 35 UG and PG subjects are being offered. The college also has study center of IGNOU and NTT. Due to inevitable circumstances the college could not apply for accreditation but has now resolved to offer itself for assessment and accreditation by NAAC. Renowned as a reputable educational institution, Sanatan Dharm College excels in providing higher education in various fields such as Science, Arts, and Commerce. It offers both undergraduate and postgraduate programs in a wide range of subjects. In recent times, the college has expanded its academic offerings by introducing self-financed courses in B.Com., M.Sc. in H.Sc. (Food & Nutrition, Clothing & Textiles), B.P.Ed., and B.Voc. (I.T.). The college has also gained recognition for its significant research contributions across multiple disciplines.

The glorious past of the college has been an inspirational factor in the desire to make the present and the future of the college bright and magnificent. In alignment with its objective of fostering competent, ethical, and committed individuals for the betterment of the nation, Sanatan Dharm College has proactively prepared for evaluation by a Peer Team from NAAC. The faculty members engaged in this endeavor have diligently gathered essential information and sought feedback from various departments. - *The college possesses a huge auditorium with a seating capacity of almost 800 persons.*
- *The college is successfully running 15 PG, 08 UG programs and 13 PhD program. The B.Voc. (IT) program is running in the college under the NSQF Scheme of UGC as a vocational course.*

- *Most of the departments are research centers and the college promotes research activities.*
- *The College has a highly dedicated workforce of competent and well-qualified teachers.*

Institutional Weakness

- *The College is facing a shortage of teaching staff due to the significant increase in the number of students.*
- *The College has old and non-functional instruments/machines due to lack of grants from any government funding agencies. They need to be replaced/ purchased to maintain the quality of*

laboratory experiments.

- *The present lab infrastructure requires to be upgraded along with the modernization of the existing facilities as per the demand of the New Education Policy 2020 for practical purposes.*

Institutional Opportunity

- *ICT tools have been facilitated to all the teaching departments; Eleven smart boards have been installed to provide opportunity for the students to learn in a digitally sound environment.*
- *The College offers abundant opportunities for students to develop and excel in their academic pursuits as well as other related fields beyond the traditional classroom teaching.*
- *The College frequently organizes seminars and workshops where students have the chance to interact with experts in their fields and learn from their seniors in the subject.*
- *The College works in collaboration with other organizations for student training purposes which provide adequate opportunities to the students.*
- *The departmental libraries offer convenient access to reference books and textbooks for students within their respective departments.*
- *The college provides opportunities for students interested in sports to rise and shine. The college has the biggest playground in the city.*
- *The cultural programs and co-curricular activities like quiz, debate, essay competitions poster making etc. hone the mental and social abilities of the students.*
- *There is an open Gym and an Indoor Gym facility open for all.*

- *Rural Background of the students is a hindrance in acquiring proficiency in English language.*
- *Due to lack of proper transportation facilities the attendance of students is poor.*
- *The College must generate sufficient resources and implement effective mechanisms to address and eliminate its weaknesses.*
- *There is a big challenge in relation to the student's job placement after completion of their respective degree courses.*
- *Another major challenge the college faces is the lack of sufficient grants and funds from the government agencies to organize seminars, workshops and conferences. And to upgrade the existing infrastructure as well as laboratory facilities.*
- *The space of the reading room for students in the library is insufficient as compared to the large number of students.*

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As an affiliated college of Maa Shakumbhari University Saharanpur, Sanatan Dharm College adheres to the curriculum set by the university. The college lays emphasis on the teaching of syllabus within the stipulated

time. The teachers take attendance regularly and students are motivated to attend the classes. To maintain discipline and bar the influence of outsiders identity cards are checked by proctorial board and students are expected to come in proper college uniform. Faculty members from Sanatan Dharm College have served as members of the Board of Studies at the university. At the commencement of the new session a meeting of Staff Council is convened to ensure effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process. An Academic Calendar is prepared and discussed in the Staff Council meeting and after that all the Heads of the Departments conduct a departmental meeting to ensure effective implementation of Academic Calendar on departmental level. Timetable is discussed and papers are allocated. Orientation programmes for students are held. The College offers undergraduate and post-graduate courses in Arts, Science and Commerce streams. In accordance with the guidelines of NEP 2020, students have the flexibility to choose subject combinations that align with their interests and career goals. They also have the opportunity to migrate from one academic stream to another, within certain limitations.

Efforts to enrich the curriculum have been made by emphasizing practical components in relevant subjects. Additionally, students are exposed to physical education and environmental education to foster the development of their personalities in all aspects. These initiatives aim to provide a well-rounded educational experience for the students.

Numerous Add on courses are conducted by different departments that provide an additional edge. In order to enhance employability, courses in Computer Application and B.Voc. (IT) are being run in the College. All the departments in the college are using ICT tools for the benefit of the students. Furthermore, the college has implemented a feedback system to gather inputs from students. These inputs are utilized in the planning and implementation of improvements across various aspects of the curriculum.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The admission process at Sanatan Dharm College for various courses is conducted in a fair and merit-based manner. The college adheres to state government regulations regarding the reservation of seats for different sections of society. Admissions at Sanatan Dharm College are open to applicants from all classes. Differently-abled students, sports persons, students with NSS and NCC certifications, as well as Rovers and Rangers, receive benefits through the provision of weightage during the preparation of merit lists. Financial assistance is provided to students from economically weaker sections through scholarships, fee reimbursements facilitated by the State Government, and financial aid in the form of Free-ships. We have highly qualified and competent teachers who excel in their profession. The students can always approach the teachers in the departments to clarify doubts or seek advance information on topics of their concern. Remedial classes for slow learners are arranged. Special arrangements are made for physically disabled examinees during the university examination like wheel-chair, scribe etc. Lecture sessions are made more and more interactive by involving students in different activities like Projects/Surveys, Demonstrations, Lab work, Group Discussions, Seminars and Presentations. Practicals play a significant role in relevant subjects, providing students with exposure to real-world applications and the latest techniques. They are encouraged to visit the library and use the internet to access study materials.

To enhance the teaching-learning process ICT tools are used. During Covid, Online classes were conducted using WhatsApp, Google Meet and Zoom etc.

The Internal Examinations and University Examinations evaluate the program outcomes. Co-curricular activities are also aligned with Course Objectives (COs) and Program Outcomes (POs).

The College takes great pride in the accomplishments of its alumni who have excelled in various fields. The teachers at the college actively engage in self-appraisal. The college has implemented a formal feedback system to enhance the involvement of all stakeholders in the ongoing process of reform and improvement.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Sanatan Dharm College serves as a research hub for various disciplines, including Physics, Mathematics, Hindi, English, Geography, Sanskrit, Economics, History, Zoology, Political Science, Botany, Chemistry, and Commerce. The College encourages and supports research endeavors by offering skilled supervisors, well equipped laboratories, a comprehensive library with access to INFLIBNET and ICT tools. To foster a conducive research environment, the College has established a research committee responsible for addressing research-related matters and cultivating an atmosphere that is conducive to research activities within the institution. Certain subjects in the curriculum have dissertations and project reports. Teachers actively participate in seminars and workshops, where they present their research papers and strive to have them published in esteemed journals. The College's diverse academic streams enable convenient access to local resources, facilitating the progress of research scholars. Most professors actively mentor and guide these scholars in their respective areas of expertise.

Faculty members' engagement with external universities and institutions broadens research perspectives and fosters exploration in diverse areas of study. The College's focus on local issues facilitates thorough investigations, leading to insightful and well-informed solutions for immediate neighborhood problems. The College proactively offers assistance and support to the community and society, unsolicited. Apart from various postgraduate-level seminars organized by departments, the College has successfully conducted one National Seminar and one National Webinar. Additionally, faculty members have authored noteworthy books in their respective areas of interest, providing valuable resources to the academic community.

Every year, the NSS units of the college undertake village camping programs, making noteworthy contributions to nation-building. They actively engage in initiatives such as promoting women's literacy and empowerment, protecting the environment, ensuring road safety, and advocating for human rights. This interaction between students and society has proven to be mutually beneficial. The students gain firsthand experience of rural life in India while their work generates social awareness among communities residing at a considerable distance from the city. The College also has NCC units for girls and boys and Rovers-Rangers. NCC cadets are actively involved in cleanliness and plantation drives, in organizing rallies, blood donation camps and electoral awareness programs.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College occupies a vast campus area of 22.07 acres and offers a wealth of infrastructure and learning resources. The administrative block and library are centrally located. There are 53 classrooms, two seminar halls and 32 labs for different subjects; Physics (05), Chemistry (04), Botany (01), Zoology (03), Geography (04), Physical Education (01), B.Sc. Home Science (04), M.Sc. Home Science (02), Computer Application (01), B.Voc.(IT) (01), Drawing (02), Mathematics (01), English Language Lab (01) and B.P.Ed. (02).

A skill development center, equipped with fifty modern computers and internet connectivity, has been set up for both college students and external individuals to learn computer fundamentals. An e-resource center for girls has been running in the computer lab of department of home science. There are ten computers in the library for

direct access of the students. Besides this there is an e-park. All the systems accessible to students are protected by firewall to prohibit access of illegal sites.

There are eleven smart boards in the College. Most of them have been installed in the laboratories. Zoology department has an animal museum as well as a distinctive insect collection. There is a botanical garden with a dazzling fountain. The College provides comprehensive sports facilities, including a yoga center, meditation room, well-maintained fields, courts, both indoor and outdoor gymnasiums, and four generator sets for uninterrupted power supply. Ramps and washrooms for disabled students have been built. The college also has a Solar Panel rooftop system of 40kW. The College offers purified drinking water through water coolers. The library and office have been automated. The number of washrooms for students and Staff members are adequate in number and well maintained. They are regularly cleaned and are hygienic. The College has a Boys' and Girls' Hostel as well as 10 Staff Quarters. The college also owns a large auditorium (almost 800 seats) and two halls with proper sound system to conduct activities and seminars. There is a display board which showcases all the upcoming events and information. Renovation and construction work takes place as and when needed in the College.

Student Support and Progression

The primary objective of the College is to support students in their holistic development, particularly in their career advancement. The College strives to facilitate students' progression to higher qualifications and suitable positions. Notably, photographs of previous year's top performers are published to acknowledge their achievements and inspire others. The prospectus serves as a comprehensive guide, providing students with essential information including eligibility criteria, merit calculation rules, and details of the fee structure. Scholarships and fee reimbursement are provided by the State Government to all students in accordance with guidelines laid down by it. Some assistance in the form of fee concession is provided by the College administration to students belonging to economically weaker section. The College provides optimal facilities for students to engage in community work, sports meets, and other extracurricular activities alongside their studies. It has dedicated NSS and NCC units for boys and girls, while the Department of Physical Education and Sports conducts various sports activities. The College provides financial assistance to students to participate in sports competitions at different venues. Our students have won many awards and medals at National and International levels in the field of Sports. The College publishes a magazine called "Kaumudi" to showcase the creative talents of its students. A Career Counseling Cell operates to assist students in exploring and pursuing employment opportunities. The Proctorial board ensures a disciplined and ragging-free environment, promoting the constructive growth of students. Wearing the college uniform and carrying ID cards is mandatory for students to prevent unauthorized individuals from entering the premises.

There is a Student Grievance Redressal Cell for timely redressal of problems of students. The presence of postgraduate courses, B.Voc.(IT), and B.P.Ed. programs enables students to pursue higher degrees and vocational training. Many students from different departments have qualified NET and JRF, while several of them have distinguished themselves in other competitions like GATE and many State Government examinations. The Alumni Association in the College has been formed. Alumni meet has been organized. The Alumni Association has been registered as a trust and its constitution has been drafted.

Governance, Leadership and Management

S.D. College and its management committee are committed to realizing their vision of nurturing tolerant,

virtuous, responsible, and productive human resources. They strive to provide a meaningful, value-based education and create an environment where students can explore and achieve their full potential. The management committee comprises competent, enlightened, and open-minded members. The President, Secretary, and committee members hold regular meetings with the Principal, who maintains continuous communication with the teachers and students.

In addition to personal meetings, email and telephonic communication are utilized to maintain a smooth flow of information vertically and horizontally within the College. The college is regularly trying to improve the quality of not only the academics but also the overall environment of the institute. The compound of the college is turning greener every day. The green audit is a testimony to this fact. Energy audits are also done and recently solar power panels have been installed. To attain academic excellence, the College receives and analyzes self-appraisal reports from all teachers. The inclusion of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in the planning and evaluation process has enhanced the systematic academic auditing of the College.

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

S. D. College is a proud possessor of able and well qualified teachers and has an adequate infrastructure to satisfy the educational requirements of the students. The college follows the directives of Maa Shakambhari University, Saharanpur to which it is affiliated. Every year, an academic calendar is made by the college based on the university academic calendar. As planning and monitoring are the key factors in continuous internal assessment, the IQAC is prompt and operative. Before the commencement of the academic session, the professor In-Charge of time table prepares the steel frame of the college time table and it is then seen and forwarded by the IQAC to the heads of the departments who along with other members design the departmental timetable and allocate the subjects. Each department designs its curriculum plan before the commencement of the academic session and tries to implement it accordingly throughout the session in the best possible ways. The teachers prepare their handbook and plan all their teaching learning activities in advance to ensure the timely completion of the syllabus.

Induction programs are organized by the college for the students at UG and PG level in order to acquaint them with the curriculum and evaluation process. Interaction of students with the teachers in the class and an analysis of their performance in the semester tests serve as another basis for identifying the students needing extra nurturing (slow learners) and advanced learners. Regular monitoring and remedial classes on a need basis are arranged for slow learners. Teachers go beyond their time table to mentor and guide these students in providing solutions to their personal as well as academics-related problems. Advanced learners are encouraged to study advanced reports and do some extra reference work and prepare projects. The research scholars are encouraged and guided to write research papers and present them in the seminars.

Teachers employ various inventive and interesting techniques to deliver the curriculum effectively like assignment writing, projects, quizzes, group discussions, model making, audio-video demonstrations, projection of films, presentations, seminars and oral tests. Teaching is done through both traditional and digital methods by using chalk and board and ICT tools respectively. Recently, we have installed smart boards in the college campus for making the teaching-learning process more interesting and effective for students. Theoretical knowledge is supplemented with field work and excursions where students explore the existing wildlife by visiting zoological parks and industries to witness the manufacturing of commodities. It helps the students to develop the power of observation, analysis and gaining first hand knowledge about the subject.

Various committees that are formed in the college oversee different activities. The departments organize workshops, seminars and guest lectures, cultural activities and competitions like essay writing, debates, poster making, slogan writing, mehndi, rangoli making best out of waste etc. These activities are aligned

with the overall development of the student and are flexibly carried out. Add on courses are also run by most of the departments, these courses give an extra edge to the academic growth of the students. All the departments act in accordance with the academic calendar for continuous evaluation of students' performance.

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The university prioritizes addressing prevalent societal issues such as gender equity, human values, professional ethics, environmental awareness, and sustainability when designing and implementing courses across various programs. This approach contributes to the comprehensive development of all stakeholders involved. The curriculum of all UG and PG program is based on values that nurture professional ethics, environmental sensitivity, social responsibility etc. Teaching human values and professional ethics is an integral component of the curriculum for students. Several activities like the celebration of national and cultural festivals, organizing camps and activities on days of national and international importance like Women’s Day, World Aids Day etc., conducting vaccination and blood donation camps, rallies for generating awareness about the environment, health, hygiene and conservation of natural resources like water, distributing necessary items to unprivileged people by NSS, series of programs under ‘Ganga Yatra’ etc are conducted by different departments.

The college has signed MoUs with industries, institution and organisations for providing exposure and training to students. Several activities and programs under the aegis of “Mission Shakti” and “Unnat Bharat” are organised in the college campus and neighbouring areas to spread awareness regarding gender and environmental issues. S.D. College follows a strict plagiarism policy to secure professional ethics and a code of conduct, CCS University at present facilitates access to anti plagiarism software “TURNITIN” to the research scholars and supervisors. The curriculum of the university incorporates values related to the environmental sustainability in courses such as Zoology, Botany, Chemistry, Physics and B.Voc. There are add-on courses like “Awareness of Human Rights” which help in the personality development of students and “Organic Farming” which focuses on the environment.

Workshops and seminars on Intellectual Property Rights, Business Competitiveness in the Digital World, Management Concepts, Cyber Security and Ethical Hacking, Promotion of Research Environment, etc

are arranged to foster a sense of professionalism amongst students. “General Knowledge”, “Tally” and “General Mathematics” are the add-on courses that pertain to skills that are significant for employment. B.Voc. program includes personality development and value-added education as a curriculum. The college also has an active Eco-Club. It organizes activities pertaining to environmental issues like celebrating “Go Green Week” with Earth Day and generating awareness about the ill effects of using plastic on the environment. Students from the Zoology department visited farms in the vicinity and educated farmers about the detrimental effects of excessive use of chemicals like insecticides and pesticides on soil and the environment in general. The farmers were encouraged by the students who were taken for the visit to adopt organic farming. The college is moving towards the use of renewable energy resources to create a clean and green environment and setting an example for other institutions to follow. The college has already installed a solar panel system. The water harvesting system is also operational. The staff of the college donates plants on special occasions, which is one of the unique practices adopted by the college.

Response:

In the College the teachers use both traditional and ICT tools for teaching with equal competence. Since the time of COVID more and more teachers have started making use of ICT tools. The teachers develop E-Content for the students. Recorded lectures of our teachers are available on YouTube channels. Information and communication technology has helped to develop positive student teacher relationship. Many teachers have attended training programmes and FDPs related to ICT tools in teaching. The college campus has Wi-Fi facility for all. A Language Lab has been established to help the students to improve their communication skills and learn English language with the help of technology.

Our college is constantly refurbished with online resources. INFLIBNET membership and N-List are regularly renewed. The library also possesses an appreciable number of scholastic or informative CDs and DVDs and E-books. Use of ICT motivates scholars to be self-supporting learners who are able to acquire information rapidly from extensive resources including global resources and helps to achieve the target of making teaching learning process student centric.

College has facility of smart class rooms. Teachers deliver lectures using projector and smart boards. Audio-visual presentations make a long lasting impact. For literature students films based on novels are screened. In laboratories also ICT tools like projectors are used to display videos of various experiments and use of various apparatus.

Google forms and other online ICT tools are used by some departments to conduct examinations and quizzes. Eminent academicians are invited to deliver lectures and students interact with them and their knowledge is enhanced. The college has signed MoUs with industries, NGOs and institutes. It provides them exposure to real working conditions and enhances experiential learning. Problem solving methodologies are also used to motivate students to indulge in case studies, surveys etc.

There is a Facebook page of IQAC of our college to showcase all the activities of the college to the society. All the departments have a PC and faculty members and research scholars have access to it. This system is used for accessing information on the internet, for developing multi-media presentations and for searching reference materials.

All the departments have official e-mail id's and most of the departments have their own individual Facebook pages to showcase their activities. Some of the students of our college also have their own YouTube channels which disseminate simplified study tricks etc. The college has ERP system that has automated the working of the office.

Workshops and webinars are also organized by different departments and students from neighboring colleges are also invited so as to enable participative learning and group discussions.

Tablets were distributed to the students of the college by the Government of Uttar Pradesh in March 2022. This was a bold and welcome step in the direction of cutting down the digital divide. The college has added another feather in its cap by launching its app – SD PG College App to encourage use of ICT and promote participative learning.

All the departments of the college maneuver to conduct internal evaluation strictly according to the university norms. At post graduate level two internal examinations are conducted in one semester. University prescribed methods of evaluation like tests, quizzes, seminars are adopted. At UG level also internal examinations are now conducted by the departments and the NEP in-charge and examination committee monitors the process. Two types of assessment are stipulated by the University, Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Comprehensive External Examination (CEE). The affiliating university has control of the CEE.

The responsibility of the college is to adhere to the directives of the University. The University oversees all CEE examination related tasks, including question paper preparations, date sheets, examination supervision, answer sheet evaluation, announcement of result etc. All CIA related information is provided by the college and the departments well in advance to the students. The examination schedule is notified and the concerned teacher of the paper conducts the internal examination maintaining all secrecy and sanctity of examination under the direction of head of the department.

The concerned subject teacher evaluates the answer sheets. After evaluating the answer sheets, the teachers show the copies to the students. A notice clearly declares the date and the time when the answer sheets will be shown. The students are free to see their copies and discuss about the marks obtained.

The grievance redressal mechanism of the college is robust and active. All grievances of the students are redressed within time. There is a grievance redressal cell also. All complaints regarding internal as well as external assessment are heard. There are several ways in which a student can voice his/her grievance. He/she can complain to the course teacher, head of the department, examination in charge, IQAC, Principal, fill the grievance form and submit in the office or e-mail his/her grievance. To ensure transparency in the internal assessment process the college has implemented the following procedure:

1. Exam dates are set in advance and students are informed well before time.
2. Students are given an explanation of CIA and CEE during orientation/induction class.
3. The students receive the CIA schedule well in advance and sample test questions are discussed in class.
4. Answer sheets are distributed to students for internal tests and quiz and students are free to voice their grievances of any sort like questions asked out of syllabus etc.

The grievance of the students sought from any source are redressed responsively. The grievance which can be rectified at college level are set right promptly. Those that are to be amended at university level like discrepancy in marks, absence in some papers etc. are collected and sent to the university either by post or in person as soon as possible and the college considers its duty to get their problems solved.

The attainment of POs and COs is evaluated on a regular basis.

- The evaluation of attainment of Course Outcomes and Programme Outcomes is done directly by conducting Internal exams, Practical work in the Lab, Viva-Voce, presentation in Seminars, Project Work, Assignments, Field Survey and Field Work, External Exams etc. External Examination held at the end of Semester/term serve to evaluate the POs and COs directly. These exams are held by the affiliating University.
- Internal exams are conducted twice per semester per subject for PG classes since past several years. For UG classes Internals are conducted as per the University norms and guidelines since the implementation of NEP.
- Indirectly students are assessed for their attainment of Course Objectives and Programme Objectives through participation in different activities.
- Students are involved in organization of seminars and workshops. This helps in attainment of programme goals to certain extent.
- They are also actively involved in organizing cultural events and co-curricular activities in order to enhance their management and organizational skills.
- Scholars are stimulated to present papers in seminars, attend conferences and present their research work in academic events. This also serves the purpose of evaluation of programme outcomes and course objectives.
- Participation in Sports Activities at the College and University level helps in estimating the fitness level of students and hence it also aids in outcome-based evaluation.
- Students enrolled in NCC and NSS are involved in a plethora of activities like arranging blood donation camps, tree plantations, electoral awareness activities, organizing sports day and other days of national and international importance.
- Programmes organized by NCC and NSS enhance the communication skills of students and

provide a platform to them to showcase their leadership qualities, teamwork and coordination and enable them to achieve their targeted goals.

- By motivating students to write poems and articles for magazines/journals their creative writing skills are honed and this helps in attainment of expected outcomes.
- Student progression is constantly monitored in order to ascertain the attainment of desired outcomes. Cracking exams like NET, GATE, JAM, GMAT, CLAT, B.Ed., TAT and TOEFL etc., getting employed in public or private sector as well as progressing to higher education are significant indicators of attainment of expected outcomes.

Response:

The college inculcates scientific temper amongst students and develops a research culture or environment via the following efforts:

- The college provides a scientific and innovative atmosphere for academic pursuits to students by establishing the required infrastructure and other precise inputs.
- The college always motivates students to attain and enhance their knowledge through observations, experiments and interpretations with the help of scientific approaches, techniques, and research procedures.
- Teachers encourage students for writing dissertations, assignments, project works and research proposals as well as for developing models, charts, posters, field reports and scientific research reports.
- The curriculum of many PG departments comprises 'Research Methodology' as a full-fledged

course/paper in which students are acquainted with the basic knowledge regarding innovative research and creations.

- Students are encouraged to participate and present their research findings through invited lectures along with oral and poster presentations in National/International seminars, conferences and workshops for communicating their knowledge and interacting with other experts. In the last five years, the faculty and research scholars have published 312 papers in National and International journals. 137 Books/ book chapters have also been published. They have presented several papers in seminars and conferences.
- There are technically advanced and well-equipped labs in the departments of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics, Drawing and Painting, Computer Applications, Home Science, Information Technology and Geography.
- Some departments also organize educational tours.
- To encourage technology-based entrepreneurship, promoting innovation at the college level and facilitating the practical application of knowledge for public use, the college has applied for an Incubation Centre.
- Practicals for testing food for adulteration are also done in the laboratory of the Department of Home Science. Students are encouraged to repeat these tests at home and teach their family members also about the same. Students also learn the technique for measuring the TDS of water.
- The college has a rich library with around 100000 volumes with the INFLIBNET facility. Digitization of the library has also been done for fast and easy access to books and e-journals.
- The college has signed numerous Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) with industries for providing career opportunities to students and exchange of knowledge.
- Computer with internet facility is provided to every department.
- The college also has an Air Quality Index Monitor installed on the premises. The laboratory in the Department of Zoology has the facility of measuring Blood Pressure, Blood Sugar and Blood group of a person.
- An innovative Indian Knowledge System (IKS) cell is established in the library to promote interdisciplinary research on all aspects of IKS, preserve and disseminate IKS for further research and societal applications. It enables students to know the rich heritage of India and its traditional knowledge in different subjects.
- An Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) cell is formulated in the college to develop policies for adoption and carry out executive activities for their implementation through the IPR cell. It also encourages researchers to obtain patents, copyrights, trademarks etc.

3.4 Extension Activities**3.4.1****Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.****Response:**

- The main objective of the extension work is to affect the development of students and strengthen their role as ideal citizens. The outcome of their work is expected to benefit the community and complement their learning experience.
- Through the vaccination camp, villagers were told about the importance of immunization. They were counselled to get their preschool children vaccinated. They were informed that government supplies these vaccines free of cost.
- Environmental awareness programs like 'Swachta Abhiyaan', 'Vriksharopan', 'Swachta Rallies', 'Safai Abhiyaan', 'Puneet Sagar Abhiyaan', etc. were organized to increase awareness among all the students.
- The College has adopted several villages like Makhiyali, Rasoolpur, Kasauli, Tigri and Barooki under the aegis of Unnat Bharat Abhiyan. In these villages problems like illiteracy and poverty are rampant and efforts have been made to solve the problems of these villagers. The college organizes 7 to 10 days camp on the outskirts of the city. Such activities complement students' academic learning experience by providing field experience for testing their knowledge and skills. For example, studying the environment as a subject and experiencing various environments are

two different things. The students have opportunities to apply their theoretical learning to ground realities such as discovering the medical and educational needs of the villagers.

- This exposure is going to equip the students for facing a variety of challenges in the outside world. They would be able to comprehend problems, compare options and take the right decisions in difficult situations.
- The college ensures the involvement of the community in its reach-out activities by organizing events and facilities. All efforts in this direction are made by NSS units or by its staff members individually or in association with NGOs, clubs, and government agencies.
- The college makes it a point that the days fixed, nationally or internationally for generating awareness in the community should be properly observed and communicated through the students.
- To make the students techno-friendly and skilled in all possible spheres of life, several workshops are organized in collaboration with other institutions every year.
- The students also ensured their participation in cleanliness and plantation drives in the college campus and the surroundings of the campus by organizing various camps. Active participation of Rovers in different camps outside the college campus is remarkably observed.
- To establish contact with the community, the college encourages faculty members to seek its cooperation at all levels.
- The college allows senior citizens to use its premises and grounds for walks in the morning and evening. Other children also use the college playground besides the college students to play.
- The college conducted many programs like Rally on Road Safety, “Balika Suraksha Shapath”, “Gharelu Hinsa se Bachne ke Upayay”, “Breastfeeding Week”, etc. under the “Mission Shakti Abhiyaan” for sensitizing the community and the students to social issues.

4.1.1

Response:

S.D. College, Muzaffarnagar is situated in the prime location of the city, which is conveniently accessible from all parts of the city and nearby regions. The entire college campus is divided into departments, laboratories, sports ground, administrative building and residential area for teachers. There are 24 well-established departments providing various courses in UG and PG levels. The campus is well equipped with 24 x 7 power and Internet facility with functional Wi-Fi to provide a full-fledged environment for teaching and enhancing knowledge among students.

Classrooms: There are 53 classrooms apart from the Science laboratories and Computer laboratories. Each classroom can accommodate around 80 students for teaching and lecture theatres have seating capacity of 120. Out of 53 classrooms there are 11 smart classrooms providing interactive classroom teaching (ICT) facility.

The classrooms are well ventilated and have adequate lights and fans to provide a healthy learning experience.

Laboratories: The college has 32 labs: Physics (05), Chemistry (04), Botany (01), Zoology (03), Geography (04), Physical Education (01), B.Sc. Home Science (04), M.Sc. Home Science (02), Drawing (02), MATLAB (01), English Language Lab (01) Computer (02) and B.P.Ed. (02). All of these have been upgraded with advanced equipments and modern facilities. Departments of Science are equipped with the necessary tools to provide research and learning environment.

Computers with latest configurations of the new generations are available in a contemporary computer lab with adequate amenities and an internet connection

Facilities for Cultural Activities and Seminar Halls: For conducting various cultural activities and seminars, there is a huge auditorium with a sitting capacity of almost 800 persons, Maa Saraswati Sabhagar and Vivekanand Hall.

Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research: There is a Museum in the Zoology department containing a wide diversity of animal specimens. A Botanical Garden with different varieties of plants and a dazzling fountain to enhance its beauty and Museum are a part of the Botany Department, that have been developed for academic purposes. All departments have their own personal

desktop systems with functioning internet. The college has a skill development Centre with 50 computers of latest configuration with internet facility for the students. E-Resource Centre for girls is established in the computer lab of dept. of Home Science. There are 10 computers for the direct access of the students in the library and 20 computers in the extended reading room of the library.

The college has a well-installed 40 kW solar panel rooftop system also.

Quarters & Hostels: The college has staff quarters and one boy's & one girl's hostel.

Sports activities: The college has a large, well-maintained playground with a running track of 400 meters, a Basketball court, Volleyball, Football court, etc.

There is a girl's common room with a sanitary pad vending Machine, Incinerator and an attached washroom.

The college has an open gymnasium, indoor gym, yoga and meditation Room for enhancing Physical and Mental well-being. The college also has two open reading areas for boys and girls separately and an IGNOU center for distance learning.

The college has a Central Library with the latest available literature and subscribed databases that caters to the intellectual needs of teachers as well as students. More than 86,870 books, 317 theses, 11 Newspapers (04 English, 07 Hindi), 11 magazines, 2500 periodicals and 3000 Journals are all housed at the library. Since 2016, the college research community had direct access to many full-text electronic journals and databases through the publisher's websites or the Inflibnet website. In 2016, the library also purchased SOUL 2.0 software from the Inflibnet Centre in Gandhinagar to automate its operations and data conversion of its collection. The library offers remote access to e-books and journals, allowing students to have expanded access to materials anywhere.

e-Shod Sindhu, which supports current as well as archival access to more than 10,000 core peer-reviewed journals and several bibliographic citations, and factual databases in different disciplines from many publishers and aggregators, has been made simple to access in collaboration with C.C.S University, Meerut library. The library does act in keeping with all the objectives laid down by the father of library science Dr. S.R. Ranganathan. The College library always seeks to ensure better coordination among all stakeholders to achieve a perfectly user-friendly existence and peaceful atmosphere. The library remains open on all working days from 09:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. During vacations: - 9:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. Library has ample space and it is running on three floors including reading rooms on I floor, one separate room for Teachers & Research Scholars, one for holy scriptures and IKS; one room for rare books, librarian's room, e-learning centre, one room for disabled students, one room for archived newspapers and washrooms.

The library has user friendly attitude and makes their visit to the library more fruitful. It offers them

- Disciplined and competent staff.
- Ready access to information.

- Help in finding the books on the shelf.
- Facility to consult reference books in the library itself.
- Separate counters for boys and girls.

The library maintains a register where students and teachers can record their attendance. The college also gets general feedback about the administration and teaching-learning process including the facilities provided by the library to its users. Based on the feedback, the Principal and Library incharge take necessary action to improve the condition.

The college has provided IT infrastructure at par with the latest available technology. The college has internet facility provided by Inter Net LY Pvt. Ltd. . The departments of the College are all well-connected through an optical fiber network that spans through the whole campus. Through this network, the teachers in every department have access to the internet. The Wi-Fi network is available throughout the campus and the faculty and employees can access this facility.

The college has a clear information policy that outlines what constitutes sensitive information within the organization and how it should be protected. Technical staff is appointed for maintaining hardware and information technology infrastructure of the campus. Institution frequently updates its IT facilities

through various systems. The classrooms are given advanced equipment and other essential facilities like complete surveillance system, electric power supply with backup, facility for high-speed communication links, LCD projectors, Smartboards etc. Computer labs are configured through Thin client network. Other than that, there is a Language Lab and E- Park with access of internet that is updated with latest version of essential software. The computers in the labs are configured with latest versions of operating system and anti-virus facility.

Different e-content and link of lectures are available on college website for students. The users who are registered to login for N- LIST programme of INFLIBNET enjoy off campus facility too. Faculties are promoted to attend workshops and seminars to update themselves with the newest technology and apply it in their teaching besides this workshop are organized in the college for faculty members to encourage them to use ICT enabled teaching learning, aids.

CCTV Cameras are installed in college campus at various locations for monitoring and surveillance purpose. The college has its own ERP and website. ERP handles various modules as finance/account modules, administration, fee and admission etc. The college has a dynamic website with various interactive links and is regularly updated. Majority of assignments and information are shared online through WhatsApp groups and google classrooms in a more effective way.

As per the requirements of the maintenance of the IT equipment, the college has a committee which looks after the IT equipment and gets them updated and repaired from time to time when required. Steps like installation of anti- virus periodically, formatting of computers, replacing of hardware of old systems and replacing old non-functional computers by new ones are taken by the committee for maintaining and utilizing computers. The college has also launched its own Android App called "SD PG College" which can be downloaded from the Google Play Store.

Response:

The college has planned a future development strategy. The institution intends to keep a positive learning environment in the teaching and learning fields, especially to fulfill the demands of the digital age. More smart classes are likely to evolve in the future. The entire staff is being made computer-friendly through various initiatives. The culture of research is also being promoted. Laboratories are being designed to support excellent scientific work. Research collaboration will be encouraged. Installing more computers is on the cards. The Organizational Structure of the College is displayed in the organogram.

The Management Committee (MC) is the highest decision-making body of the college with the Honorary Secretary and Manager serving as the chairperson. The Stakeholders, academicians, industrialists, ex-officio members, and teacher representatives are all represented on the MC, which handles policy-related issues.

The Staff Council Committee is a decision-making body that aids in the smooth functioning of the college in academic affairs, non-academic affairs, and the maintenance of discipline. This statutory body comprises all the teaching staff, the librarian, and all HoDs. The Dean of Students Welfare (DSW) is the secretary of the staff council and the principal of the college is the chairman.

The Students Welfare office has a complete organizational structure, with a Dean in charge who manages the affairs of the student's advancement. This office also deals with issues that are not academic yet benefit the students, like student fee waiving, resolving their grievances and giving a patient ear to their issues.

The College has an admission cell in charge of ensuring that the admission procedure is fair and efficient. From the beginning of notifying till the moment of final admittance, this cell monitors admissions.

The proctorial board is a complete organization in charge of maintaining discipline, keeping the college safe, and other security-related duties. They actively come in action especially during admissions and examinations.

The UP Higher Education Service Commission appoints the principal as the administrative leader. He is in charge of ensuring that academic and administrative endeavours run well. For the department to run well, the Dean and the HODs collaborate. The College also has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) that aims to achieve the objectives of quality maintenance and improvement. The IQAC is crucial in maintaining the college's internal quality standards.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The college regularly facilitates the teaching and non-teaching staff by implementing various welfare schemes such as a Wi-Fi facility, Identity cards, Sports facilities / Gym (Open air and Indoor), Staff quarters for teaching staff in the college campus (Limited), Two sets of uniforms (winter and summer season) are provided to Class IV Staff, Yoga and meditation training programs during vacation, Psychological and Psychiatric counselling etc. Doctors specialized in Psychiatry are invited for lectures and counselling sessions. There is a medical institute in the campus where the teachers and non-teaching staff both get medical facilities. Medical leave, Maternity benefits to permanent staff and also temporary staff with full pay, Child Care leave are also made available. For financial support, there are two separate welfare funds for teaching and non-teaching staff in the college. **Welfare funds for teaching staff** are extended in case of serious illness of a faculty member or dependents and death of a serving faculty member. **Welfare funds for non-teaching staff** are provided in case of serious illness of a staff member or dependents and death of a serving staff member. This fund has a balance of 431331/- as on 01 April 2022. During the last five years, twenty staff members/families have been extended this financial support.

Performance Appraisal System

- The college encourages the faculty members to attend Faculty Development Programmes (F.D.P.) such as Orientation programmes, Refresher courses, and short-term courses, etc. for their career development.
- Teachers fill out appraisal reports in the format given by UGC, in which all relevant information is provided and this self-appraisal form is submitted to the IQAC.
- Promotions are based on UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) which is based on API score.

Besides Academic activities teachers are expected to perform other assigned additional duties. Weightage is given for these contributions in their overall assessment.

When the promotion of any teacher is due, he/she is given prior information. They are expected to fill the proforma of CAS, which is checked and verified by the Dean, then IQAC.

Teachers who are eligible for promotion and have completed all the requirements of the promotion according to CAS and recommended by the IQAC are required to face the screening/selection committee which is headed by a government nominee and comprises three subject experts also. The teachers in our college are given promotion well in time.

Performance Appraisal of Non- Teaching staff

Non-Teaching staff is assessed based on their commitment to work, character, habits, departmental abilities, diligence, discipline, punctuality, behaviour with others, power of drafting (For ministerial staff), management and organization of documents (ministerial staff), willingness to learn, technical abilities (in case of technical workers).

This performance report is prepared by the Office Superintendent and submitted to the principal. Finally, the principal examines the performance appraisal and takes necessary action. If a candidate of class four is a graduate and his performance is outstanding, he can be promoted to class three (in case there is a vacancy). Some have got benefitted from this scheme.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**6.4.1**

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

This Key Indicator considers concerns with financial management, resource mobilization, budgeting, and the best possible use of funds. The institution has created channels for securing funds and making sure that its financial administration is transparent. Through routine internal and external audit, the Institute's revenue and expenses are carefully scrutinized. S.D. college is particular in conducting financial audits regularly for its financial years which begins from 01 April and ends on 31 March. Every year both internal and external audits are conducted. A record of all the income and expenditure is maintained. For the internal audits college hires a qualified chartered accountant who goes through all the financial details minutely, scrutinizes all the bills and vouchers, receipts etc and tallies them with the entries in the account cashbooks. If any discrepancy is found it is reported and corrected. The external audit is carried out by an auditor appointed by the government.

The institute has received funds from various sources such as building rent from Punjab & Sindh bank, and also from Nursery Teacher Training (NTT), rent of 12 shops from S.D. Association, rent of cycle stand, IGNOU Study Centre. The fund received from last five year is tabulated here

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell of S.D. College remains actively engaged in upgrading the quality of academics and in planning, guiding and monitoring activities of the college for quality assurance and quality enhancement. It plays a key role in the development of a system of conscious and consistent improvement in the overall performance of the college and helps the various departments to channel their

efforts and plans toward promoting a comprehensive academic and administrative distinction.

IQAC has taken the following steps to implement its strategy to achieve desired goals of quality enhancement -

1. The IQAC strategy intends to ensure the college standards across the multiple levels of academic and administrative systems. IQAC is institutionalizing and internalizing quality assurance strategies and processes at all levels.
2. IQAC ensures planning, implementation, assessment and monitoring of all Internal Quality Assurance activities and assures the performance of all departments through sensitization of faculty and staff members.
3. IQAC facilitates the creation of a learner-centric environment. IQAC recognizes best practices and identifies individual or departmental professional development needs.
4. IQAC ensures the implementation of all academic activities/events mapped in the academic calendar of the college.
5. IQAC conducts quality audits, collects and analyses feedback from all stakeholders concerned with quality assurance processes. After a detailed study and analysis of the information collected, IQAC informs the departments /office concerned and ensures rectification of the flaws.
6. IQAC prepares annual Quality Assurance Reports. On the basis of the feedback collected from the students, teachers, employers and parents.
7. IQAC ensures enhancement and coordination among various activities of the college and institutionalizes all good practices. It motivates departments to organize or participate in seminars, workshops, FDPs, extension services, etc.
8. IQAC also takes care of the timely promotion of the teaching faculties. IQAC scrutinizes the UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) and gives its recommendations. It makes preparation for the meeting of the selection committees and co-ordinates with the government nominee and subject experts. In December 2020-21, one faculty member was promoted to assistant professor (Academic Level 10 to 11) and two assistant professors (Academic Level 11 to 12) were promoted to associate professor grade. In June 2022, fifteen associate professors were promoted to professor grade (Academic Level 13A to 14) with the efforts of the IQAC.

1. Title

EMPOWERING WOMEN THROUGH COMPREHENSIVE EDUCATION

2. Objectives

- To provide a safe and culturally inclusive environment for girls.
- To uplift their self-confidence.

3. The Context

Education is the key factor for women empowerment; women need to be empowered in every field. To fight against the socially constructed gender biases, women have to swim against the system which requires more strength. Such strength comes from the process of empowerment and empowerment comes through education. To implement this practice the college had to face a plethora of challenging issues.

4. The Practice

In keeping with its objective of Women Empowerment, the college encourages the girls to spread their wings in all dimensions of healthy college life. Holistic methodologies are adopted to empower them physically, mentally and shape them into healthy young citizens with character, value and culture.

- Projects, Seminars, Discussions and Extension Lectures provide a forum for them to think.
- As per the guidelines of UP government, many programmes like cybercrime awareness, self-reliance activities like teaching how to become self-dependent, marshal arts training, programmes on gender equality like “chuppi todo khul k bolo” etc. are organized under the aegis of Mission Shakti Abhiyan.
- Plenty of opportunities are provided to girls to participate in Inter College Competitions and Youth Festivals. Girls participate in sports activities and win medals.
- Posters, Slogans, Quotes in favour of respect for women are installed in key areas of college.
- Girl students are motivated to join NSS & NCC to carve in them the sentiment of service toward

society & nation. A separate NCC battalion has been created only for girls, 26 UP NCC Balika Vaahini.

- Facility of Scholarships and Fee Concessions are provided to needy and deserving girls. The fees of all girls are lesser than the fees of boys. Tuition fees is not charged from girl students.
- There is a separate girls' common room with facility of toilet and sanitary pads vending machine and incinerator. There is also an open reading area reserved only for girls.

5. Evidence of Success

- More than 60% of total students registered in our college are girl students.
- Girls of our college are able to grab considerable number of prizes in co-curricular activities.
- Our girls excelled in the sports arena and romped home several medals in Inter Collegiate competitions.
- Remarkable results in academics in all classes speak volumes of our success in sharpening the intellect of girls.
- Many girl students qualify NET and other competitive exams every year.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- The first barrier in the way of efforts of the college to foster women empowerment is society's general mindset. The girls feel the pressure as they have to go against the system and socially constructed gender biases to enter the college for higher education.
- More vocational courses are needed to be introduced in the college to facilitate the girls with skills to become financially independent.

2. Objectives

The focus behind this green campus program is to ensure the continuity of sufficient water, waste management, conservation of natural resources, and other resources for the future. More stress is being given to the proper infrastructure development so as to continue and maintain green practices. The campus is designed with several initiatives for reducing energy consumption and utilizing renewable natural resources such as solar panels. Environmental awareness- We aim to promote a green and plastic-free environment, comprehensive recycling, conserved energy and self-sustainability in areas of power, water and cleanliness. Our college compound is automobile free. The college organises awareness programmes, plantation drives, promotes the use of environment-friendly energy-saving electrical appliances, dumping of bio-degradable waste within the college, management of wastewater and solar panels etc.

Our college has been actively organising public rallies in which teachers and a large number of students participate to spread awareness in society on different aspects such as Swachhata Abhiyan, Right to Education, Unity, De-Addiction (Nasha Mukti), Green Environment, Pollution, Road Safety and Cybercrime etc.

Social health- The college is also concerned with social health, blood donation camps are organised within the college in association with different organisations, experts are invited to educate and aware the students regarding their health. During the COVID-19 pandemic times college organised free vaccination camps for everyone in the college campus at regular intervals. Our oxygen cylinder in the Chemistry department was also available for needy people.
